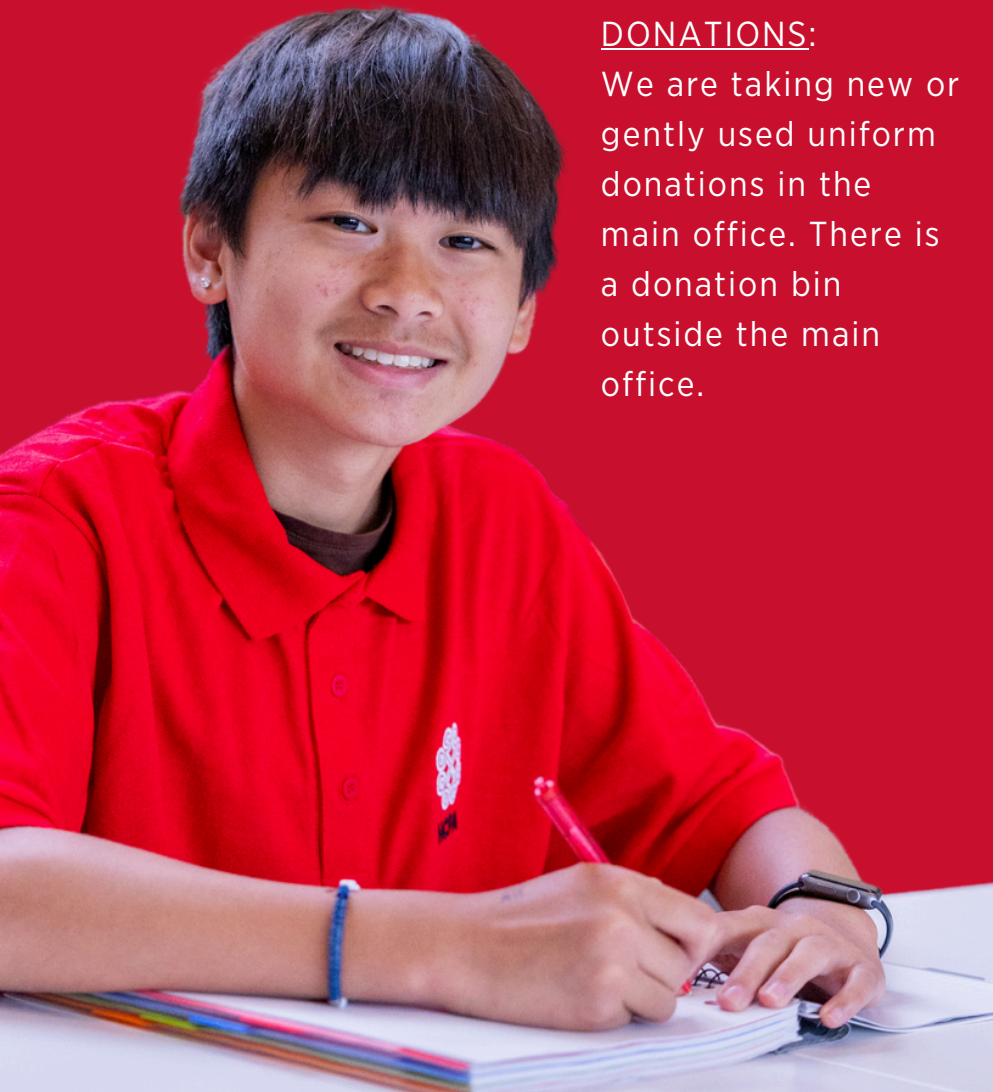
UNIFORM POLICY

**Middle School Basketball:**

The middle school basketball team ended their season with a bang, both teams finishing second in the city in the city-wide tournament, as well as winning against local rival Journey School. The season was a very successful one, and the teams both very much grew as players and teammates.

Girls High School Basketball:

The girls' basketball dropped another close game to Parnassus Prep on Tuesday, but they are buoyed by one of the top scorers in the metro area with Malenna Khang averaging over 12 points a game. The girls continued to work hard, turning in close losses to local powerhouses Edison and Como, and their first win of the year was against Lincoln School. The girls lost a competitive matchup against Community of Peace Academy but are looking forward to many winnable games in the future.

Boys High School Basketball:

The boys played a very challenging opponent at Metro Schools College Prep, but even that loss could not deter the boys. Led by Tou Win Yang's 20+ points per game, they won a tough game against rival Prairie Seeds and lost a close JV game to Math & Science Academy.

Xavier Yang and Tou Win Yang (11th graders) were both among the conference leaders in scoring. Despite a tough loss to conference-leading Avail Academy. The team turned a lot of heads with a huge overtime win over Community of Peace Academy which saw many lead changes and clutch shots. With half the season still to play, the boys have reached their highest win total since 2017 after a rewarding victory against the International School of Minnesota.



TRANSPORTATION

We would like to remind you of the importance of ensuring your student's safety.
